

**From Michael Kerins – Author, Storyteller - Founder S.L.A.T.TCharity  
Inaugurator of KerinsNaumov translation competition**



I visit a lot of educational establishments both here in the United Kingdom and abroad, and without doubt Perm State Humanitarian Pedagogical University Faculty of Foreign languages led by Dean Tatyana Germanovna Loginova is somewhere, and someone very special to me. The Dean runs a remarkable faculty, and when I hear Russians in Perm and elsewhere in Russia speak in English I know by their level of pronunciation and in particular the way they pronounce the letter “H” whether or not they studied at Perm State Pedagogical University. At all levels, including my own spheres of translation practice, translation theory, English practice all are obvious and her motto – LACK OF PRACTICE – means - LACK OF PRACTICE. In other words if students ***do what is expected*** of them, they will get what they deserve. If they ***don’t do what is expected*** of them, then they will get what they deserve.

The Dean has continually selected students who have been of great assistance to us and were ideal for key roles such as collecting and delivering us safely to and from Moscow. Social visits in and around Perm, with trips to see AMKAR, or attend the ballet. I first visited Perm State Pedagogical University in the early days of the twenty-first century. Although not my first visit behind the former “Iron Curtain” it was my first visit to Russia, and I fell in love with the people, their thirst for knowledge of the outside world. Remember back then many citizens of Perm had never met a foreigner and they had a real honest curiosity about what we, and the outside world, were about. I often recall visiting a branch post office away from the city centre and the post-mistress had never seen or spoken to a foreigner and she was EXTREMELY suspicious about my motives in buying stamps to send postcards and letters to friends and schools in Scotland, the USA and throughout Europe. She asked my interpreter to point out that there were other post offices in the city.

## KerinsNaumov International Translation Competition

This was set up, in 2002, in conjunction with former student Nicholas Alexandrovich Naumov. Николай Александрович Наумов and me.



Nicholas Naumov was sent by the then Centre for Scottish Studies to meet me in Moscow and be my interpreter and helper. On the Kama train, he wrote a pair of poems, which were given to me, and I set up an online international project to have them translated, I ended up with forty-six languages. These were then published; here in Scotland, and with the profits Naumov and I agreed to set up an international translation competition. Initially I wanted to call this the NaumovKerins competition. Tatyana Loginova explained that Nicholas would insist on my name first. She was right. This was the first of many examples of how she knew both the personality and the traits of hundreds of students under her care. The Dean has been a firm supporter of this project since the first prizes were won by freshman Boris Kruze. Boris now Dr. Boris Kruze, PhD Associate Professor, Foreign Language Education Department, Deputy Head, IB Professional Development Provider Center Perm State Humanitarian-Pedagogical University, is the first of many student interpreters who became friends and beneficiaries of Kerinsnaumov as it grew to become S.L.A.T.ECharity

This competition is open to all students of English who study at any of the centres of Higher Education in Perm Russia. It is the only competition of this kind in the world and gives any student the chance to read contemporary English written by a wide variety of native English speakers. Articles have been submitted by native speakers from Canada, The United States, England, South Africa, Ireland, China, Wales, Australia and Jamaica and of course Scotland.

Some years ago a few students at Perm State Technical University asked to join the competition.

Last year the KerinsNaumov was widened to include German to Russian and now involves both students of German at PSHPU & School 12 – a German language school situated in the downtown area of Perm.

I would have no hesitation in recommending Perm State Humanitarian-Pedagogical University, as a great opportunity to learn English, appreciate the wider world, be of service to the wider community and thrive in an academic environment where, if they practice and study, they will get what they deserve.
